Dear Sir:

I am writing this letter to express my feelings and concerns about two important events – and two important people – in my life.

In December 2002, police in Modesto, California, asked for help in finding missing mother-to-be Laci Peterson. My daughter Amber Frey courageously came forward to reveal her relationship with Scott Peterson.

This year, my son Jason stepped up when our President called. He is presently in Baghdad, proud to serve as a captain in the United States Army.

They both deserve thanks and respect.

Instead, when I watch TV shows, I see Amber being attacked and made to look like a bad person. So-called experts on these shows – who have never been lucky enough to meet her and know nothing about her – feel free to blacken her character.

For her bravery in coming forward and helping police she has been rewarded by being exploited for other people's gains, not hers.

I know this cannot be a good example for our children: if you stand up and be honest, your credibility is going to be attacked and some people will try to ruin your life.

I also see TV shows on which other "experts" question President Bush's decision to go to war in Iraq. Now, with our soldiers and marines still risking their lives to fight terrorism, is not the time to second guess him.


My son is a seasoned military man and will do his duty just fine. But our young soldiers don't need to have their morale lowered by "armchair experts" questioning their dangerous role.

As for Amber, I know that despite the pain she is being put through, she will continue, like my son, to do the right thing.


You asked me why I am in Modesto.



Dear Mr Brazelton:

As you know, I have been involved in the Laci Peterson case, through my daughter Amber, since shortly after it began, and I agree with the State Attorney General when he called it a "slam dunk" case.

Now it is up to the prosecution to put it all together and convince 12 jurors – not the public -- that Scott Peterson is guilty. But the assistant D.A. is up against one of America's best defense attorneys, and in my opinion has his hands full.

You've mentioned, Mr Brazelton, that you are holding your cards close to your vest. I hope that when my daughter Amber testifies you will play those cards for all they are worth. Scott was so cruel to Amber that her recovery from it is remarkable. She tells me that giving evidence will not be hard for her -- she is determined to simply tell the truth.

I have great respect for you, and I would hope that you would be in court to take my testimony if needed, provided you are in robust enough health to do so.


I recall that you told me the state had run out of the funds necessary to put Amber in a witness protection program. I accepted that and did what I had to do to provide her with the appropriate protection, because I realized that if Scott had murdered his wife, and if he found out that Amber was helping you in your investigation, then her own life could well have been in jeopardy. His calls to her after Laci disappeared made me extremely uncomfortable – especially when he was trying to see her.

I am disturbed by this question: does Mr. Geragos have the right to defend a person he said so many times on television was truly guilty?

Rest assured that if you decide to have me testify I will be 100 per cent truthful and cooperative. But I beg of you, please don't subpoena me if you don't intend to introduce me as a witness.

I have been asked to speak out many times about this case, and I have not done so. But I don't want to be under a gag order that could prevent me from defending my daughter if she is unfairly attacked.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR, THE MODESTO BEE

Dear Sir:

I am writing to you as the father of Amber Frey and as a possible witness myself in the Scott Peterson murder trial.

Since the trial began last week, I have listened with a sinking heart to the opinions of national experts who have strongly criticized the performance of the Modesto prosecutors and second-guessed them.

If I am asked to testify, I would prefer to be examined by the District Attorney, Jim Brazelton, rather than a younger assistant district attorney. Mr. Brazelton is the person I dealt with after the case began and I appreciate his experience and wisdom.


I would also prefer to be cross-examined not by Mr. Geragos, but by his assistant. I find it hard to forget it was Mr. Geragos, through his appearances as an expert on TV after Laci Peterson disappeared, who convinced me that Scott was guilty. Now he's trying to prove that Scott is innocent.

It's like the old joke about the lawyer who catches an accused man lying under oath, refers to his earlier testimony and says, "Are you lying now or were you lying then?"

Either way, Mr. Geragos appears to be lying, and I would prefer not to have my testimony taken by an apparent liar.

When Mr. Geragos was hired by the Peterson family he said he would prove that someone else, not Scott, murdered Laci Peterson. To date, they don't seem to have found an alternative murderer. But, I'm sure Mr. Geragos will do his best to confuse the jurors--and the jurors must realize that or justice will not be done.


I therefore urge you to make an urgent motion to sequester.

Dear Sir,

As a concerned citizen who is closely following the Scott Peterson double murder trial, I am confused by the oft-repeated words, "circumstantial evidence."

To my mind it is a very simple, factual case.

Fact #1: Scott didn't simply tell Laci's mother that she wasn't home when he got back from fishing, he told Mrs Rocha she was "missing" – strange wording that struck dread into her heart.

Fact #2: His lack of concern over her disappearance.

Fact #3: He continued to pursue an affair with another woman at a time when everyone else who knew Laci was frantically trying to find her.

Fact #4: When Laci's body washed up in the area Scott admitted he went fishing, in she was dressed in the same clothes she was wearing on December 23 – not the clothes Scott said she was wearing when he left home on the 24<sup>th</sup>.

Fact #5: When Scott was arrested he was obviously about to flee. He had attempted to disguise himself, and was carrying several thousand dollars and his brother's ID.

It doesn't take a rocket scientist to figure it out.


If the prosecutors are going to win this case, they have to stick to the facts, and not confuse the jurors.
